

A World Health Challenge: Comparing Solutions

Topic: You will describe a specific health challenge that exists in the world today. You will then analyze and compare how two separate countries are trying to solve the problem.



Presentation Time: 4-5 minutes

(Note: This is not a group project.)

Goals:

- ❖ Practice professional presentation skills (verbal and nonverbal)
- ❖ Review organizational skills
- ❖ Explain graphs and charts
- ❖ Use an “Audience Involvement” technique
- ❖ Use the target vocabulary and expressions in your presentation
- ❖ Use the sentence structures for comparison and contrast

Process:

Step 1: Choose a specific **health issue** that is currently afflicting many people.

Step 2: Choose **two countries** that are working hard to alleviate the effects of that health issue.

Step 3: Research each country’s **approach to solving** the problem.

Step 4: Analyze and **compare** each solution.

Step 5: Explain **which solution** you think **is better** and why that solution is better.

Part 2 Writing a Definition

When giving a presentation it is important that you clearly define certain terms so that your audience can understand exactly what you are mean. For example, if you are talking about “tuberculosis” and you don’t provide a specific definition your audience may be lost from the beginning of your speech. Here is the process for providing a definition:

- 1) State the word/term
- 2) Provide clear and basic information
- 3) Provide facts or examples

Example:

Vague: Tuberculosis is a disease.

Better: Tuberculosis is a preventable disease.

Even Better: Tuberculosis is a preventable disease the kills nearly 2 million people every year.

Add clear and basic information/Add facts or examples:

Tuberculosis (also called **TB**) is a preventable disease the kills nearly 2 million people every year. The disease is highly **contagious**, that is, it can spread from one person to another very easily. **Symptoms** of tuberculosis include fever, cough, night sweats, weight loss and loss of appetite. A vaccine for TB has existed since 1921 but it may have **side effects**.

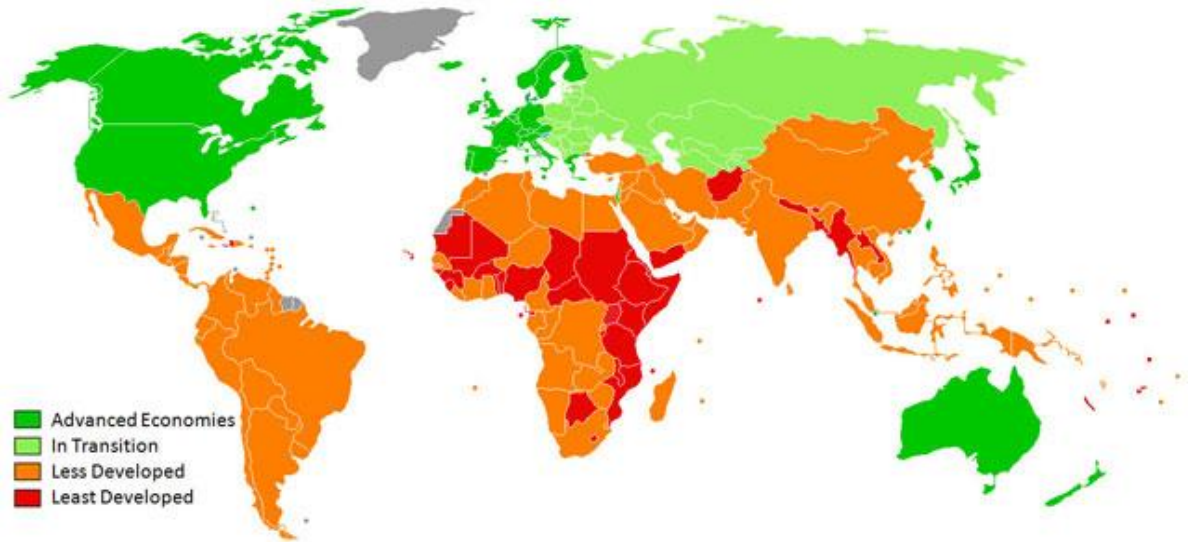
